Examinations – Instructions to Candidates EXAMINATIONS SERIES 2017 - 2018

This booklet of instructions applies to all final examinations, controlled assessments, coursework and on-screen tests taking place from September 2017 to August 2018.

REMINDERS

- When you have been issued with a final Examination Timetable you must check that all the examinations you are entered for appear on your timetable.
- **Morning examinations begin at 9.00am; afternoon examinations begin at 1.00pm (You must check the seating plans for final rooms and times)**
- Seating plans are already displayed.
- Check the seating plans for your examination room and seat no.

Remember it is your responsibility to make sure that you arrive at the correct place at the correct time on the correct day.

I SEATING ARRANGEMENTS FOR EXAMINATIONS

- The examination room will be set out in rows and lines.
- Each row is given a letter e.g. A, B, C etc and each line is given a number 1, 2, 3 etc. Each student will therefore have a 'Battleship' number for each examination. This number will usually be different for each examination.
- On the day of the examination the seating arrangements for the day's examinations will be posted up in your designated areas.
- Each student needs to find out his/her Battleship number each morning prior to the examinations.
- It is essential that all students find out their individual Battleship numbers prior to the examination starting if the examination is to begin on time.

2 EQUIPMENT

- You will be provided with pen(s), pencil(s), rubber, protractor and compass if needed. It is advisable to bring a spare pen and pencil with you.
- **ALL EXAMINATIONS MUST BE WRITTEN IN BLACK INK.**

3 EXAMINATION ROOMS

- No books, coats, sweets, bags or other materials may be taken into the examination room. Bags and coats must be left in the bags outside the main hall and sixth form hall, for all small rooms please do not bring any personal items with you
- Eating is forbidden during examinations unless there are good medical reasons for doing so and you have a note from a medical professional.
- A small bottle of water, no larger than 500ml, may be taken into the examination room. It must be a clear (non-coloured), see through bottle with a non-spill sports cap and must have all labels removed. You must not bring fruit juices or fizzy pop to an examination. **ALL BOTTLES NOT FITTING THIS DESCRIPTION WILL BE CONFISCATED.**
- Coats, hats and scarves may not be worn in the examination rooms.
- Instructions for the use of calculators or formulas, reference materials and paper must not be brought into the examination room. Pre-programmed calculators are not allowed unless the memory has been cleared.
- The use of erasing fluid, e.g. Tippex, is not allowed by examination boards.
- All students found with forbidden items in their possession must be reported to the examination boards (as per examination board regulations), whether they intended to use them or not. In most instances examination boards will disqualify you from your examination. Please consider how this will jeopardise your future.

- Graffiti – the writing, drawing or the marking of desks is forbidden. You will be charged for any repairs that need to be done to a desk
- **MOBILE PHONES, PAGERS, TABLETS, I-PODS, I-WATCHES, MP3/4 PLAYERS OR ANY TECHNOLOGICAL/WEB ENABLED DEVICES ARE STRICTLY FORBIDDEN IN AN EXAMINATION ROOM. DO NOT BRING ANY OF THE ABOVE TO AN EXAMINATION.**

4 EXAMINATION BOARD REGULATIONS

- Examination regulations apply as soon as you enter the examination room. Any talking or communication of any kind between candidates during this time or while the examination is in progress will result in the candidates being reported to the examination board (as per examination board regulations) and may lead to disqualification from this and any other examination for the board concerned.
- Students must not enter the examination rooms with writing on their arms, legs and hands.
- If you have any doubt about anything on the examination paper, then raise your hand and ask an invigilator when he/she arrives at your desk. The invigilator will decide if any help can be given.
- If you need to leave the examination room for whatever reason, raise your hand to attract the attention of an invigilator. You will not be allowed to leave the examination room and return unless accompanied by a member of staff.

REMEMBER! ONLY IN AN EXTREME EMERGENCY WILL THIS BE ALLOWED.

- No student will be allowed to leave before the full duration of the examination.

5 LATE CANDIDATES

If you are late for an examination the invigilator will inform you as to whether you are still eligible to sit the examination or not, according to examination board rules. The examination boards must be informed of any student arriving late to an examination.

Please Note: The examination board may only mark your paper up to the normal finishing time.

6 ILLNESS

- If you are unable to attend an examination due to illness the Academy must be advised before **8.15am.**
- If you fail to take a final examination because you are ill you will not be able to sit the examination at a later time during the same examination series.
- If you fail to turn up for an examination because you are ill it is sometimes possible to be awarded a grade based upon an estimate of what you might have achieved.

- In order to qualify for this the Academy must have a medical certificate from your Doctor for the appropriate day of the examination(s) involved. It must be stated however that a grade is not awarded in all cases.

7 AFTER YOUR EXAMINATION HAS FINISHED

- You will either return to normal lessons or leave the Academy premises depending on the finish time of your examination.

Information for candidates

Guidelines when referring to examinations/assessments through the Internet

This document has been written to help you. Please read it carefully.

We all like to share our experiences when taking examinations. However, it is important to consider what you say. Your comments may lead to an investigation for malpractice and result in the application of a penalty.

Awarding bodies monitor social media and websites. They do not wish to see candidates jeopardise their marks or grades as there are significant consequences for anyone caught breaching the rules for examinations, controlled assessment or coursework.

The rules are set by the Joint Council for Qualifications^{CIC} (JCQ^{CIC}) on behalf of all the awarding bodies and can be found at: <http://www.jcq.org.uk/exams-office/malpractice>

Examples of statements or activities that will lead to a malpractice investigation include:

- copying or allowing work to be copied – i.e. posting written work on social networking sites prior to an examination/assessment;
- collusion: working collaboratively with other candidates beyond what is permitted;
- allowing others to help produce your work or helping others with theirs;
- being in possession of confidential material in advance of the examination;
- exchanging, obtaining, receiving or passing on information by any means of communication (even if just attempting to);
- passing on rumours of exam content from another candidate.

This list is not exhaustive. Other instances of candidate malpractice may be considered by an awarding body.

If you are found guilty of breaching any of these rules you could find yourself facing:

- a warning;
- the loss of marks for a section, component or unit;
- disqualification from a unit, all units or qualifications; or
- a ban from sitting exams for a set period of time.
